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

THE POLICE FOUNDATION ADVANCES PROGRAMS THAT PREVENT VIOLENT CRIME, THWART TERRORISM AND SAFEGUARD THE PEOPLE OF OUR CITY


The Foundation is committed to funding programs that help to keep New York safe. For over 35 years, the Foundation has funded the **Crime Stoppers** program which rewards members of the public for anonymous tips which lead to the arrest and indictment of violent felons. In the past year, the maximum reward paid out by the program was raised from \$2,500 to \$3,500, providing a critical boost to this invaluable crime-fighting tool. To date, over \$2.7M in reward funds have been distributed, leading to over 3,500 cases solved.

The Foundation also supports the NYPD's Counterterrorism operations which are among the most comprehensive in the world. Through the **International Liaison Program**, the Foundation makes it possible for NYPD Intelligence Officers to be stationed in cities around the world where they can gather information on international counterterrorism efforts and report in real-time to their counterparts back home.

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The New York City Police Foundation's support of the NYPD continues to advance our efforts in preventing violent crime and staying up-to-date on emerging trends in terrorism, essential to keeping our citizens safe.

THWARTING TERRORISM

The NYPD is on the front line when it comes to protecting New York City from the threat of terrorism. Fortunately for everyone who lives, visits or works in New York, the NYPD is the most professional and capable Police Department in the United States. But even with their expansive capabilities, the dedicated men and women of the Department still need our help to ensure that they have the tools necessary to do their job. That's why the New York City Police Foundation devotes significant resources every year to fund vital counterterrorism programs which go beyond the city's budget. Since 2002, the Foundation has funded the stationing of the NYPD Intelligence Bureau's International/Domestic Liaisons, who are placed strategically throughout the world and are responsible for compiling timely and accurate information on terrorism-related threats, attacks, and transnational crime. NYPD Liaisons develop and maintain relationships with local and foreign law enforcement agencies allied in the global war on terror. The Foundation also funds the purchase of highly-trained explosive detection canines which

are capable of detecting the airborne particles left behind in the wake of a person who is carrying explosives, enabling them to find that person or any devices they leave behind in large moving crowds.

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We need to be positioned 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, all around the globe to react in New York City in real time.

STRENGTHEN COMMUNITIES

THE POLICE FOUNDATION WORKS TO STRENGTHEN COMMUNITIES BY BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS BETWEEN THE NYPD AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS, INCLUDING YOUNG PEOPLE ACROSS THE FIVE BOROUGHS.

The Police Foundation has a long history of working to bring the police and communities together through increased dialogue and positive interactions. Strong relationships between police officers and members of the community lay the groundwork to resolve neighborhood concerns and enhance safety for all.

In 2020, the Foundation helped to launch **127 Penn** in East New York, which is the home of the first-of-its kind NYPD Community Center. The Foundation continues to fund multiple programs at the Center to increase the services provided to the community and expand 127 Penn's role as a cornerstone of police and community relations.

Among the programs housed at 127 Penn is the **Options Program** which helps New York City Youth build decision-making skills and access career-development opportunities. Over 10,000 New Yorkers aged 14-18-years-old have participated in Options workshops which use virtual reality technology to teach emotional intelligence and de-escalation techniques that can be applied in real-life situations. In 2020, the program was expanded to offer a pathway to career development through educational workshops that lead to job training and placement opportunities with the Foundation's partners.

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Options really opened a new world of opportunity for me. I have a new perspective on what is possible, not only in my own life, but with my friends, with my neighborhood and with my relationships with the police.

ENHANCE LEADERSHIP

THE POLICE FOUNDATION DEVELOPS PROGRAMS TO ENHANCE LEADERSHIP, WELLNESS AND TRAINING WITHIN THE NYPD.

Enhancing police training and wellness improves policing outcomes for communities. The Foundation's efforts include funding for Personal Protective Equipment to keep officers healthy and providing access to free, confidential mental health services at one of the city's leading medical institutions.


The Foundation has sponsored the training of 125 NYPD instructors in the **ABLE** (Active Bystandership for Law Enforcement) **Project** which trains first responders in intervening when necessary to prevent their colleagues from causing harm or making costly mistakes. ABLE aims to create a police culture in which officers routinely intervene to prevent misconduct, avoid police mistakes, and promote officer health and wellness.

The Foundation has also helped to launch **Finest Care**, a partnership between the NYPD and New York-Presbyterian Hospital to connect all uniformed service members with free, confidential counseling and other mental health services.

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Despite these unprecedented times, the members of the NYPD will continue to answer the call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It's essential we support them.

PILOT NEW TECHNOLOGIES

THE POLICE FOUNDATION PILOTS NEW TECHNOLOGIES AND PROVIDES RESOURCES AND SERVICES TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC AND THE POLICE.

In the 1970s, the Police Foundation purchased the first bullet-resistant vests for 18,000 service members before they became standard issue for the Department. Recently, the Foundation has continued this legacy by purchasing 550 new light-weight detective vests for the **Detectives Vest Pilot Program.**

The Police Foundation has also piloted a new **Neighborhood Policing app** that helps the NYPD identify, log, track, and address community complaints. The app creates a mobile case management system for police, allowing officers to view the full history of a complaint.

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The New York City Police Foundation has played a critical role in advancing innovative new programs and supporting the NYPD for 50 years.

50 GRANTS FOR 50 PRECINCTS

THE POLICE FOUNDATION IS CELEBRATING ITS 50TH ANNIVERSARY BY FUNDING INNOVATIVE NEW PROGRAMS AT NYPD PRECINCTS.

In 2021, the Foundation announced a \$1 million grant program, 50 Grants for 50 Precincts, to encourage innovative new initiatives within NYPD precincts. The program solicited proposals directly from NYPD precincts throughout the city that promote officer wellness, support community engagement efforts, honor fallen officers, and other ideas that serve the needs of a local precinct and its community.

Some of the winning proposals include:

Brian Simonsen Youth Field Day, 102nd Precinct in Queens: To honor and remember Detective Brian Simonsen, who volunteered as a coach and mentor, the 102 Precinct hosted a Field Day of sports and athletic activities for several schools and community members.

Visions of Harmony, 17th Precinct in Manhattan: Police Officers worked with students from the High School of Art and Design to host an art contest, with the winner getting the chance to create a design to decorate the garage door of the precinct with community members invited to unveiling ceremony. The winning design "Unification of Color" is pictured at right.

WAVE (Women Against Violence Emerge), Housing Bureau Public Service Area 4 (PSA4):

The WAVE program connects domestic violence victims with fellow survivors. Meetings are facilitated by Domestic Violence Officers, and held 3-4 times a month. The officers in PSA 4 will decorate meeting space to create a more welcoming environment for the participants, and to expand the program to other commands.


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These grants are a great demonstration of how the New York City Police Foundation has supported New York's Finest for the past 50 years.
